Members of the Governing Body reflect the diversity of the local community. The chair is elected at the beginning of every academic year. The Governing Body is responsible for implementing Local Education Authority policies and Welsh Assembly Government legislation. Their role is like that of the board of directors in the world of business. The full Governing Body meets once every term. The Headteacher prepares detailed reports to be received and discussed by the governing body. These reports contain information about pupil achievements, curricular developments, staffing matters, etc. Governors regularly attend relevant training, monitor the school's performance carefully and support several school activities.

Appointment of Governors

Periodically, there are opportunities to elect parent representatives to the Governing Body. You will be informed of these vacancies as they arise. We currently have two vacancies (see table above). Community Governors are coopted by the board with a mind to ensuring that we have a broad representation of the local community and of relevant skills. If you would be interested in joining, please contact the school or the Chairperson with an expression of interest. Staff Governors are elected by the staff of each school. Local Authority Governors are appointed by Carmarthenshire Council.

Information about the Beca and Bro Brynach School Federation

Leadership

The Federation has a dedicated and experienced leadership team, which includes Mr. Mark Bowen, Miss Sian Bryan and Mr. Ben Batcup. Together, they work collaboratively to ensure the smooth operation and strategic development of both schools within the Federation.

The Federation's Language Policy

Welsh is the official language of Ysgol Beca and Ysgol Bro Brynach. Welsh is the only medium of instruction in the Foundation Phase. English is introduced into the curriculum as a subject in Year 3. In accordance with the Bilingual Policy of the Education Authority, standardised learning resources are provided to ensure that pupils can communicate easily both verbally and in writing in both Welsh and English by the time they leave school.

Curriculum and Parent/Carer Engagement

Governors' Annual Report to Parents

December 2024

The Curriculum for Wales became statutory as of September 2022 and learning is identified as a learning continuum. A summary of the school's curriculum can be found on the school website.

The four purposes are at the heart of the curriculum and are the starting point and aspiration for the schools' curriculum design. The aim of a school's curriculum is to support its learners to become:

- ambitious, capable learners, ready to learn throughout their lives
- enterprising, creative contributors, ready to play a full part in life and work
- ethical, informed citizens of Wales and the world
- healthy, confident individuals, ready to lead fulfilling lives as valued members of society

As part of the new curriculum, there is no right for parents to withdraw their children from relationship and sexuality education.

The Federation's curriculum will continue to be developed and reviewed, and staff will carefully plan to ensure curriculum requirements are successfully implemented to enable children to experience a wide range of teaching styles; including whole class, mixed ability groups, paired and individual approaches to learning. Planning from September 2024 will be building on pupils' previous knowledge and understanding.

Pupil voice will be an integral part of our curriculum. It will be pupil informed and dependent on the interests of the children as much as is possible, whilst still ensuring coverage of the curriculum. Each new theme begins with engaging 'Spark' sessions, where pupils can share what they already know and express what they would like to learn. Additionally, both schools invite parents/carers, together with their children, to complete a theme ideas sheet, providing families with a voice and meaningful input into the content of the term's theme.

The School Development Plan focuses on specific curriculum areas and other aspects of the school's operations, identifying key targets for improvement. These targets are monitored and reported on termly basis, this is checked through core visits from the schools' School Improvement Advisor.

We aim to provide a diverse range of purposeful learning activities appropriate for the age and developmental stage of each child. If you would like to discuss any aspect of the school curriculum, you can do so with your child's class teacher. We hold regular parents' evenings at which you can discuss your child's progress and targets, and open evenings when you can come to school and see your child's classroom environment and books. Parents / carers will receive an end of year report by their child's class teacher.

Both schools have social media pages, a school app and a half termly newsletter, with updates and photographs of school activities, where we have permission to share these. Access to these is available on the school website. We need parent/carer consent to share images of pupils. If you would like to update your consent for use of photography at any time, please contact the school.

Additional Learning Needs Provision

Children and young people with ALN need extra support to learn. This would be because they either find it harder to learn than other children of the same age or have a disability that means they cannot use, or find it difficult to use, facilities for learning in our school. Some children and young people who need extra help in school do not have an ALN. This may be children who just need some help catching up.

The extra support given to children with ALN to help them learn is called additional learning provision (sometimes called ALP). This must be written into a support plan called an individual development plan (IDP). Additional learning provision for a person aged three or over is education that is additional to, or different from, what is made available to most children of the same age. Additional learning provision is specifically designed for children or young people who require extra assistance to make progress, beyond what most of their peers of the same age typically need. Additional learning provision can be delivered by teachers or teaching assistants. It can also be delivered by specialist services like a speech and language therapist or teachers of the deaf.

The ALN system emphasizes increased collaboration, and we will work with you, your child and other professionals following the person-centred approach to decide how best to meet your child's needs. Our school will move children

to the ALN system after giving you an IDP notice. An IDP notice means we have decided that a child has ALN and an IDP will be made for the child. A no IDP notice means we have decided that the child does not have ALN and an IDP will not be made for the child. For example, children may be given a no IDP notice because their needs have changed, and they no longer need additional support to learn. Sometimes, disagreements can arise. Most of the time, disagreements can be resolved by discussing the problem with us. If you are unhappy with anything, you should make your views known as soon as possible. Always speak to the school's additional learning needs coordinator (ALNCo) as soon as you have worries or concerns so that that can be resolved at an early stage. If you are still unhappy, then you can talk to the local authority to seek further advice.

Teachers at the school possess expertise and are committed to provide a purposeful education for all pupils including those with Additional Learning Needs. Parents / carers who have any concerns regarding the educational, physical, emotional development or behaviour of their child are invited to discuss them with the class teacher, Headteacher or ALNCo (Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator).

Miss Sian Bryan is the ALNCo (Additional Learning Needs Co-ordinator) and works across both Ysgol Beca and Ysgol Bro Brynach.

Physical Education and Sports Activities

We encourage all pupils to live healthily and to look after their bodies. Physical Education is an integral part of the school's timetable and sessions are allocated for physical education during the week. Teaching about the effect of physical education on the body and nurturing attributes such as effort, fair play, playing together, perseverance and self-confidence. The Physical Education provision at the school is varied and includes games, gymnastics, dance, swimming and athletics in line with curricular requirements. Ysgol Beca and Ysgol Bro Brynach have several sports teams that provide an opportunity for pupils to compete individually and as part of a team. These teams compete in Urdd competitions and in local festivals such as rugby, football, and netball.

Extra-curricular clubs have been led by the Urdd, school staff and volunteers. Thank you to all of those who have supported the schools with this provision.

Also, both schools come together during the summer term to participate in a Federation health and wellbeing day. This year, it was held at Llanboidy Football Club and the pupils enjoyed mixing and participating in various activities. In addition, pupils collected sponsorship money to raise funds for their respective school.

Students and Work Experience Pupils

When opportunities arise, both schools do welcome students from Trinity St. David's University and Coleg Sir Gâr for placements as part of their training, as well as pupils from the area's Secondary Schools on work experience.

School Buildings & Premises

The school premises are maintained to ensure a safe, clean, and welcoming environment for pupils, staff, and visitors. Regular inspections are carried out to identify any necessary repairs or improvements. Any works required to address health and safety concerns are promptly attended to by contractors appointed by the county, ensuring compliance with all relevant regulations and standards. The diligent work of the cleaners and caretakers in maintaining high standards of cleanliness throughout the schools is very much appreciated.

Toilet Facilities

Ysgol Beca

Toilet facilities at the school meet the needs of pupils. For pupils in Year 3 – Year 6, the toilet conveniences are made up of 4 toilets, each in a separate cubicle next to their classroom. For pupils in Nursery – Year 2, the toilet conveniences are made up of 4 toilets, each in a separate cubicle next to their classroom. The toilets are cleaned daily by a cleaner. The school pays for the services of a cleaner employed by the Local Authority. There are toilets for staff/visitors including one that is accessible to wheelchair users which has a changing bed.

Ysgol Bro Brynach

Pupils in Year 1 - Year 6 have access to 4 toilets, each in a separate cubicle. Nursery - Reception pupils have access to 4 toilets each in a separate cubicle in their classroom. There are two sets of toilets for staff members and in addition

a disabled toilet and a changing bed. There are separate toilet facilities available for staff and pupils in the school hall building. The toilets are cleaned daily by a cleaner. The school pays for the services of a cleaner employed by the Local Authority.

School Staff

We are very fortunate to have a hard working and committed team of staff at both schools who work extremely hard to ensure that all children have the best possible opportunities and enjoyment at school. I would personally like to thank them all for their continued commitment and diligence to their roles.

For the 2024-2025 academic year, both schools have an attendance target of 95%. Schools across Wales are continuing to work closely with the Education Welfare Officers (EWOs) to track and support those families where attendance is below satisfactory. The school and EWO aim to work in a supportive role but now have the power to process fines and refer to prosecution where attendance levels do not improve despite intervention. The school

monitors attendance and punctuality on a regular basis. Absence from school is a contributing factor in low pupil achievement, so Welsh Government continues to target attendance. Parents are encouraged to take holidays when school is closed, or these days may be recorded as unauthorised absences.

Where attendance falls below an acceptable level, the school will work in collaboration with the Education Wellbeing Officers and parents/carers to improve attendance rates. Warnings and fines may be issued where deemed necessary. Parents/carers must notify the school of their child's absence, providing a valid reason, whenever pupils are unable to attend. The school issues attendance information to parents/carers and the end of every term and when necessary. Further information about school attendance can be accessed here.

If you wish to take your child out of school for a holiday you must complete a holiday request form available from the school office.

Request: A few children arrive late for the start of school. This not only puts them at a disadvantage but also disrupts the learning of others. Please, make every effort to ensure that your children arrive on time as this helps them develop habits that will benefit them, not only now, but in the future. Pupils can arrive between 8:40 and 9:00. Registration begins at 9:00. Regular attendance at school is essential and missing school can have a significant impact on achievement over the course of a year as shown below:

School Improvement and Strategy

ESTYN Inspection

ESTYN reports for both Ysgol Beca and Ysgol Bro Brynach are available on the ESTYN website. Ysgol Bro Brynach were asked to produce a report on effective practice following the inspection: Effective use of the outdoor areas to develop pupils' skills across the curriculum.

Our School Development Plan Priorities (2024-2025)

Priority 1: Develop an effective plan under the guidance of the county's numeracy to improve pupils' problem-solving skills when applying and connecting the 5 skills in a variety of real-life contexts across the curriculum.

Priority 2: Develop a digital system that tracks pupils' progress, enabling teachers to adapt their teaching to support and challenge all pupils appropriately.

Priority 3: Supporting pupils to improve their use of Welsh in informal situations.

Priority 4: Develop the roles and effectiveness of leaders at all levels to ensure improvement across the Federation.

Priority 5: Refine planning to ensure that pupils make solid progress in their digital skills.

Both schools are working towards these priorities with a comprehensive strategy for monitoring, evaluation and improvement, led by the Senior Leadership Team and supported by the Local Authority and the Governors.

Following the recent Estyn inspection and report, Ysgol Beca and Ysgol Bro Brynach will prioritise acting on the areas for improvement identified by Estyn to ensure continued development and success. The key areas for improvement highlighted by Estyn are:

- R1 Continue to develop effective leadership across the federation
- R2 Ensure that planning enables pupils to make sound progress in their digital
 chills.
- R3 Ensure consistency in the arrangements for embedding the role of pupils in their learning across the federation.

Developing the Beca and Bro Brynach Federation of Schools

We continue to strengthen collaboration across the Federation, creating opportunities for pupils and staff alike. Pupils enjoy joint educational visits, themed days at each other's schools, and the chance to build friendships that will support them as they transition to secondary education. For staff, the Federation fosters a collaborative environment, enabling shared planning, the exchange of strengths, and teamwork to drive improvements across both schools.

Healthy School

As always, we continue to promote an active lifestyle at both schools that allow children to develop their physical skills and their awareness of healthy eating. We do this through formal lessons and the use of visitors from external

agencies which promote exercise for fun and healthy eating. We also continue to make good use of our school garden to develop pupils' understanding of growing food. All pupils take part in outdoor learning activities throughout the year. All our classes learn about being healthy through their curriculum topics, with pupils having the opportunity to benefit from visitors such as the Carmarthenshire Sport Development Officers, School Nurse, Fire Service, NSPCC, and PCSOs to learn more about keeping their bodies and minds as safe and healthy as possible. The school is also completing the Whole School Approach to Emotional and Mental Wellbeing survey to ensure that the school focuses on the wellbeing of pupils and all stakeholders.

Fruit Shop

The Fruit Shop is active in both schools. The purpose of the shop is to encourage eating healthy snacks and fruit and vegetables can be purchased daily, weekly or termly. Pupils who do not wish to buy fruit from the shop are welcome to bring their own fruit and vegetables themselves as a snack. As a school we do not allow unhealthy snacks.

Healthy Packed Lunches

Pupils are welcome to bring a packed lunch to school. As a school that actively promotes health and well-being, we encourage parents/carers to prepare healthy packed lunches for their children, reinforcing our consistent messages about healthy eating and drinking.

Drink

Water and Milk are the only drink we will provide in both schools to comply with the Regulations Healthy Eating in Schools. Children are encouraged to follow healthy lifestyles and to keep hydrated during the day by accessing clean drinking water. Pupils can bring water bottles daily. Free Milk is available for all learners in Nursery to Year 2. Fresh water is also available for pupils to drink with their lunch in the lunch hall.

Free School Meals for all Primary School Children

As a result of the increasing pressure in terms of food costs on families, the free School meals scheme was introduced in September 2022 and now all pupils of primary school age receive universal free school meals. Please be aware that families can continue to access or register for a School Essential Grant (see below).

Additional Information

PDG and School Essentials grants available for families

Don't forget to apply for Free School Meals if you can – even if your child already gets a free school meal as part of universal provision. In addition to the free meals, being registered also gives your child access to further support at school (through our PDG) and financial assistance at home (through School Essentials).

A School Essentials Grant provides financial assistance of up to £125 per child for the purchase of items such as school uniform, shoes, waterproofs, sports kit, equipment (bags, stationery), IT equipment (laptops, tablets). Check if you're eligible for help with school essentials and apply online through Carmarthenshire Council website.
